A member of a prominent German resistance family and a former prisoner in Buchenwald and Dachau, Dr. von Hammerstein is a Protestant minister and a founder of the bridge-building organization, "Action Reconciliation – Service for Peace," that is active in Israel, Europe, and North America.

Silent Courage, by York University Professor Gottfried Paasche, documents the life of his mother, Marie-Therese Paasche, Dr. von Hammerstein's sister, who helped to rescue Jews from the Nazis. The film will be introduced by her granddaughter, Rabbi Sara Paasche-Orlow.

Dr. Smith and his brother, Dr. James M. Smith, co-founded the Beth Shalom Centre in England for the study and commemoration of the Holocaust, which seeks to expose and counter antisemitism. Formerly the executive director of the Canadian Race Relations Foundation, Dr. Mock now chairs a new Ontario Government advisory committee charged with fighting hate crimes and strengthening community groups. As a teacher, expert witness, and community organizer, she has worked against all forms of bigotry.

The founder of Ve'ahavta, the Canadian Jewish Humanitarian and Relief Committee, which pursues *tikkun olam*, mending the broken world, through aiding the homeless in Toronto, collecting funds for disaster relief in Darfur and Pakistan, organizing volunteer programs in Africa, and other initiatives.

Mr. Justice Michael H. Tulloch

An alumnus of York University, a judge of the Ontario Superior Court of Justice, and a former Crown Attorney, Mr. Justice Tulloch has been president of the Canadian Association of Black Lawyers, a member of the Commission on Civilian Oversight of Policing, and a participant in the review of post-secondary education chaired by former Ontario Premier Bob Rae.
